Module 1: Understanding UK Visas

Types of UK Visas

- 1. *Visitor Visa*: For tourists, business visitors, and family visitors.
- 2. *Student Visa*: For international students pursuing academic studies.
- 3. *Work Visa*: For foreign workers with specialized skills.
- 4. *Family Visa*: For family members of UK citizens or permanent residents.
- 5. *Settlement Visa*: For individuals who want to live permanently in the UK.

Eligibility

- 1. *Age*: Depending on the visa type, applicants must be at least 16 years old (Student Visa) or 18 years old (Visitor Visa).

Module 2: Visa Application Process

Step 1: Determine Your Visa Type

Step 2: Check Eligibility

- 2. Ensure you meet the age, education, and other requirements.

Step 3: Gather Required Documents

- 1. *Passport*: Valid for at least six months beyond your intended stay.
- 2. *Photograph*: One recent, passport-style photo.
- 3. *Birth Certificate*: For Student Visa and Family Visa.
- 4. *Diploma and Transcripts*: For Student Visa and Work Visa.
- 5. *Proof of Financial Support*: For Student Visa and Family Visa.
- 6. *Medical Insurance*: For Student Visa and some Work Visas.

Step 4: Complete the Online Application

- 1. *Visa Application Form*: Fill out the online application form on the UK Government website.
- 2. *Pay the Application Fee*: Pay the required fee for your visa type.

Step 5: Attend an Interview

- 1. *Biometric Data*: Attend an appointment to provide biometric data (fingerprints).
- 2. *Interview*: Attend an interview at a UK Visa and Immigration Application Service (UKVIAS) centre.

Step 6: Wait for Processing

- 1. *Application Processing*: Wait for your application to be processed.
- 2. *Decision*: Receive a decision on your visa application.

English Language Proficiency

- 1. *English Language Test*: Take an approved English language test (e.g., IELTS, TOEFL).
- 2. *Exemptions*: Check if you're exempt from taking an English language test.

1. *Academic Qualifications*: Ensure your academic qualifications meet the UK's National Recognition Information Centre (NARIC) standards.

Maintenance Funds

1. *Maintenance Funds*: Show proof of sufficient maintenance funds to support yourself during your stay.

Module 4: Visa Types and Requirements

Visitor Visa

- 1. *Length of Stay*: Up to 6 months.
- 2. *Requirements*: Passport, photograph, proof of financial support, and medical insurance.

Student Visa

- 1. *Length of Stay*: Up to 4 years (undergraduate), 2 years (postgraduate).
- 2. *Requirements*: Passport, photograph, birth certificate, diploma and transcripts, proof of financial support, and medical insurance.

Work Visa

- 1. *Length of Stay*: Up to 5 years.
- 2. *Requirements*: Passport, photograph, diploma and transcripts, proof of financial support, and medical insurance.

Family Visa

- 1. *Length of Stay*: Up to 2.5 years.
- 2. *Requirements*: Passport, photograph, birth certificate, proof of financial support, and medical insurance.

Module 5: After Receiving Your Visa

Entering the UK

1. *Port of Entry*: Present your visa and supporting documents to a UK Border Force officer.

Registering with the Police

1. *Police Registration*: Register with the police within 7 days of arriving in the UK (if required).

Maintaining Your Visa Status

- 1. *Comply with Visa Conditions*: Ensure you comply with the conditions of your visa.
- 2. *Extend or Switch Your Visa*: Apply to extend or switch your visa before it expires.
